

the Pallottine monks in 1917.






WELCOME TO ARDI BEYOND BROOME

DAMPIER PENINSULA

Get off the beaten track and immerse yourself in our paradise. The Dampier Peninsula is one of the few untouched pristine areas where you get a real feeling of space and solitude, with amazing scenery and stunning views from many of the guest rooms, safari tents and campsites.



The Dampier Peninsula is Aboriginal land comprising four larger communities and a number of small communities and outstations.

As you travel, respect the land, culture and privacy of the local people, especially where access is restricted. Most roads and tracks off the Cape Leveque Road lead to private residences. Please observe the local access protocols and private property signs.

Do not enter into Aboriginal land unless you have a prior booking or arrangement. Upon arrival at each Aboriginal community you are required to register at the community office.

BOOKINGS ARE ESSENTIAL WHEN STAYING OVERNIGHT ON THE DAMPIER PENINSULA

BEFORE YOU TRAVEL

When you travel through the Dampier Peninsula you are travelling on Aboriginal lands. The area is almost entirely made up of Native Title Land, while communities and outstations are all on private leases.

STAYING ON THE PENINSULA

There is NO FREE CAMPING anywhere on the peninsula. BOOKINGS ARE ESSENTIAL if you are staying overnight.

All communities and outstations are on private leases. You must call ahead or have a booking before visiting.

There are NO DUMPING POINTS ANYWHERE on the Dampier Peninsula

DAY VISITORS

On occasion, communities may close for cultural or other reasons. Always call ahead to confirm a community is open before visiting.

Lombadina, Beagle Bay, Ardyaloon, Cygnet Bay and Middle Lagoon are open to day visitors. Entry fees may apply.

Always call into the community office immediately upon arrival to register and pay any applicable entry fees. They will provide local information and advise of any restrictions in place.



The Cape Leveque Road is the main road on the Dampier Peninsula and is now fully sealed. A large 4WD is essential when visiting the peninsula as many of the destinations and community access roads are unsealed and conditions vary throughout the year. These roads are typically dusty and corrugated with some soft sandy sections. Many are narrow with dense bush overhanging. During periods of wet weather (generally between November and April) these roads can be closed. Check road conditions with your local host or Shire prior to departure if there has been recent rain. Please drive carefully and make sure you have plenty of fuel and water.

OUTBACK RULES OF THE ROAD

- A 4WD vehicle is highly recommended when visiting the Dampier Peninsula, especially for driving along access roads. Vehicle recovery can incur significant costs.
- Travel is only permitted on designated roads.
- Slow down, when driving on any unsealed road. Some roads are only
 wide enough for one vehicle. Dust may be disguising an oncoming
 vehicle, potholes, loose gravel, soft sand, slippery mud or stray cattle.
- Turn on your headlights where visibility is poor. Slow down or stop and pull over if you can't see the road in front of you.
- On narrow unsealed roads it is a good idea to stop and pull over if a larger vehicle is coming towards you. Many vehicles roll over by drivers trying to continue driving up the embankment.
- Keep checking your mirrors for other vehicles trying to overtake you.
 It is common courtesy in the outback to slow down, pull to the left with your indicator on and let vehicles pass you.
- If you see someone broken down or stopped in the outback it is a courtesy to stop and ask if they are OK.
- If you are hiring a 4wd or not an experienced driver on unsealed roads, ensure you know how to operate the vehicle, have adequate lessons or practice and can engage 4WD.

THE WORLD'S OLDEST LIVING CULTURE

The Dampier Peninsula is home to Aboriginal people of the Ngumbarl, Nimanburr, Jabirr Jabirr, Nyul Nyul, Bardi and Jawi language groups.

For more than 40,000 years traditions and protocol have dictated Aboriginal lore and society. Prior to the arrival of Europeans, trading systems connected local Peninsula people to inland groups. Trading also occurred with people arriving by sea, long before European colonisation.

BielBiel (Jawi) or Gaalwa (Bardi) A traditional raft used to travel between islands to hunt, fish and trade with neighbouring peoples.

HISTORY

Pearl shell is of great spiritual significance to the saltwater people of the Dampier Peninsula and is known to have been traded across Australia for over 22,000 years, making it one of the world's earliest forms of currency.

Named after the mariner and explorer William Dampier who visited in 1688, the Dampier Peninsula became integral to the pearling industry out of Broome in the 1860s. The reality of these early pearling days is a stark contrast to its romantic image. Aboriginal people were often forced into slavery to work as divers in harsh and dangerous conditions, an illegal practice known as blackbirding. These pearling operations brought European, Chinese, Malay, Philipino, Koepanger, Afghan and Japanese people as businessmen, divers and maritime workers. Today, these ethnic origins are evident throughout the Kimberley.

Considered prime grazing land, many large cattle stations were established on the peninsula in the late 1800s displacing Aboriginal people. Missions set up and controlled by churches and missionaries were government granted reserves of land, to which Aboriginal people were relocated.

Today, local Aboriginal entrepreneurs have established businesses in various fields including: tourism, marine and land management, civil and construction, native foods and art.



NATURAL WONDERS & AMAZING WILDLIFE

Fast-moving tides create whirlpools and cascading waterfalls that rise out of the ocean. A charter boat or scenic flight from the Dampier Peninsula is the best way to experience these natural phenomena.



BARDI JAWI GAARRA MARINE PARK

AUSTRALIA'S FIRST MARINE PARK CO-DESIGNED WITH TRADITIONAL OWNERS

Declared a National Park with Habitat Protection in 2018, the Marine Park is a hotspot for marine wildlife such as whales, turtles, dugong and the elusive snubfin dolphin. Encompassing some 74,000 square kilometres, with depths from less than 15 metres to 800 metres, the sea country of the Bardi Jawi and Nyul Nyul peoples extends into Marine Park.

Featuring islands, reefs and intertidal systems with significant foraging and hunting habitats, the park is rich with cultural significance, and continues to be used by Bardi and Jawi people for hunting and fishing for food, cultural activities and business, as it has been for many thousands of years.

THE MARINE PARK COVERS 204,000 HECTARES


Humpback whales migrate up the Kimberley Coast resting in several bays along the western side of the peninsula from July through to November. Spectacular breaching and whale activity can often be seen close up to the shore. A rich diversity of tropical fish and rays exists on the limestone reefs and the shallow rock pools.

Poisonous marine life including stone fish inhabit the reef, please do not touch. Marine stingers are not reportedly a significant concern for the northern beaches, though always take appropriate precautions. There is a crocodile and shark risk anywhere in the warm waters in the north of Australia. Exercise caution, observe signs, seek local information and do not use small craft or swim in tidal creeks.

Keep a look out for the amazing diversity of land-based wildlife including Frilled-neck lizards, snakes, sea eagles, wallabies, dingoes and the mighty bowerbird.




Rock formations, ancient footprints and the remarkable pindan cliffs characterise the peninsula and mesmerise photographers. The islands of the Buccaneer Archipelago can be seen from the eastern side of the peninsula, and if you are there at the right time of year, you can sometimes see your own private 'Staircase to the Moon'.

SEE THIS COUNTRY THROUGH OUR EYES

The focus on sharing culture involves actually experiencing saltwater life. Many of the residents live in accordance with their traditional culture and values. Visitors have the opportunity to stay in communities and out with families on their outstation blocks and gain insights into the lives of the saltwater people.

Sharing culture is a rewarding exchange, where you can experience living in harmony with the land and sea. It is a chance to get away from it all and immerse yourself fully in a new experience. The change of pace and wide open spaces will always leave a lasting impression and reignite the weary traveller. The peaceful seclusion, amazing landscapes and warm friendly hosts will ensure your stay is enchanting and unforgettable.

RESPECT FOR COUNTRY

It is very important to the local residents that all visitors appreciate and respect the land. Please always stay on designated tracks, observe signs, camp in designated areas and dispose of waste properly. Do not feed or touch native animals, marine life or birds and always leave the natural environment as you find it, leaving only footprints behind. Importantly always properly extinguish campfires with water and cover with soil to ensure that you are not responsible for starting a wildfire which could endanger property and lives.




- Take all rubbish with you

Whether it's a la carte restaurant dining with spectacular ocean views or foraging for seasonal bushfoods on a cultural tour, be sure to sample the many unique culinary experiences on offer.







EATING OUT & TAKEAWAY

It is advisable to bring food and beverage supplies with you. Basic supplies can be bought at all community stores. No alcohol can be bought on the peninsula. Most accommodation allow you to BYO but please do check ahead. Supplies for lunches can be bought at Beagle Bay, Lombadina, Djarindjin Roadhouse and Ardyaloon Community.

Cygnet Bay Pearl Farm Restaurant

Open Monday to Sunday, for breakfast, lunch and dinner during the dry season; April to November (limited opening during the wet; December to March). Relax in the licensed restaurant with stunning views over the bay, cool off in the adjacent infinity pool, and try the rare delicacy of pearl meat fresh from the farm.

Kiosk:7am to 9am

Breakfast: 7.30am to 10am (no bookings required)

Lunch: 11.30am to 2.30pm

Happy Hour: 3pm to 6pm (available at the kiosk)

Dinner: 5.30pm until 8pm (bookings essential).

Pool: Open all day.

All meals are available as takeaway. Call 9192 4283 to order.

Djarindjin Roadhouse

The roadhouse is open every day in the dry season from 8am to 7.30pm for refreshments, such as coffee and ice-cream, as well as basic grocery supplies. Burgers and other freshly made takeaway meals are available all day. No hot chips after 7pm.


Lombadina Bakery

Bread is baked in a wood-fired oven Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and is sold to the public from the office.

Alcohol

No takeaway alcohol is sold anywhere on the peninsula, check with your hosts if it is acceptable to bring your own alcohol.







FISHING

Fishing tours are offered at some local communities and campgrounds. Lombadina offers charter boat tours departing on request. When staying at campground or community, fishing is only permitted within their private lease. It is forbidden to fish on neighboring leases without permission.

Always be aware of size and bag limits, and please respect the fact that many of the local people still live off the land and depend on future fish stocks. Please never take more than you need for your next meal. Fisheries Officers frequently do random checks and fines apply to anyone caught in breach of the rules.

TIDE TIMES

Tide times vary depending upon location. Check with your local host or visit the Ardi website for more information www.ardibeyondbroome.com.au

BOATING

There are no marine rescue or public boat ramp facilities on the Dampier Peninsula. Several locations have private boat ramps, permission is required to launch your boat.

BUSH FIRES

Check fire regulations with your hosts. Most campgrounds provide controlled areas for campfires. Preferably use a fuel stove or BBQ for cooking. Extinguish fires completely with water and soil and clean up. Take cigarette butts with you. If you see a bush fire, call ranger (refer to page 63 at the back of the brochure). Check with your hosts for emergency information.

EMERGENCIES AND FIRST AID

In case of emergency call nearest Clinic or Police. Refer to page 63 at the back of the brochure for Emergency Contacts

RFDS referrals are required to see the clinic nurses first. Clinics are located at Beagle Bay, Ardyaloon and Lombadina. If you are likely to require air lifting, take note of your nearest airstrip. Except in extreme emergencies, Ardyaloon, Lombadina and Beagle Bay are the only suitable airstrips for the RFDS to land.

Prepare for extreme weather, emergencies and breakdowns. Plan ahead and make sure your vehicle is in good condition. Always carry a first aid kit, at least one spare tyre, plenty of food and water and make sure someone is expecting you. Drive according to road conditions and leave yourself plenty of time to get to your destination. Only drive on designated roads. Be sun smart and protect yourself from bites and stings.



BARDI JAWI & NYUL NYUL RANGERS

The Nyul Nyul and Bardi Jawi Rangers have both a men's and women's ranger teams, who are actively involved in land and sea conservation and management on their country. Nyul Nyul rangers actively work in and around the Beagle Bay and Pender Bay areas where as Bardi Jawi rangers work in the northern part of the Dampier Peninsula and coastal islands.

The Indigenous ranger program is seen as the natural progression of a cultural practice dating back thousands of years. One that allows for the continued custodial maintenance of country, linking young people back to country and culture while creating employment opportunities in remote communities.

The rangers take pride in looking after their country in culturally appropriate ways. They are responsible for carrying out many tasks. Some of these include;

- Presenting educational talks to schools
- Presenting talks via Indigenous tourism businesses
- Invasive weed management
- Collecting data on marine turtle and dugong populations
- Biodiversity surveys for threatened mammals such as the Bilby
- Patrolling by land and sea for evidence of illegal foreign fishing, vessel debris
 and working in conjunction with the Australian Quarantine Inspection Service.
- Estuarine crocodile removal and management
- Fire mitigation and wildfire control

Freight is expensive and only comes in twice per week therefore product lines are limited, and prices can be higher than in Broome.

Most stores and operators have credit card facilities. It is advisable to carry a small amount of cash with you. Or if you are relying on credit card, call ahead to check if credit cards or eftpos are accepted. An ATM is available at Beagle Bay store. Check ahead as cash supply is limited.

Fuel is available at Beagle Bay, Djarindjin Roadhouse, Lombadina, Cygnet Bay and Ardyaloon (One Arm Point). All work on a card system with \$20, \$50 or \$100 prepaid cards. Cards must be purchased during opening hours of the store, office or workshop. Diesel and ULP is sold. Refer to the table above.

PHONE & INTERNET COVERAGE

Telstra 4G coverage is available at major communities as well as some other areas including Pender Bay, where signal strength may vary. Some operators offer a mobile signal booster. Most pay phones in the area require prepaid calling cards. Cards can be purchased from the community stores.

Check with your service provider for information on mobile coverage, and log your trip details with a responsible person.

If you rely on a pre-paid SIM for internet coverage, it is advisable to top up before visiting the Dampier Peninsula.

PENDER BAY 8 THE MIDDLE LAGOON REGION

Pender Bay is culturally known as a changeover, a sharing area between the Bardi, Nyul Nyul and Nimanburr peoples of the Dampier Peninsula.

A National Heritage listed coastal wilderness, it ensures this idyllic secluded enclave remains a place to experience the pristine environment, from land-based whale watching to enjoying the diverse marine life of the Dampier Penisula. It's a great area for bird watching, swimming, snorkeling, and fishing to gorgeous kilometers of unspoilt beach walks and pindan cliffs.

Pender Bay is a recognised humpback nursery. A Marine Whale Research Base was established there to focus specifically on the study of humpback whales. Between June and September, the bay is visited by one of the world's largest populations of humpbacks. It is known as one of their birthing bay nurseries and resting grounds to teach the young before they migrate south to the Antarctic. You can view these majestic creatures from various lookouts around the Pender Bay and the Middle Lagoon areas.

Most of this area is restricted under Native Title except for a cluster of small tourism ventures offering a range of accommodation types from self-contained to camping. There are also several private outstations located in the area where visitor entry is restricted.



Access to tourism destinations is via the Middle Lagoon Road and it is roughly 2.5hrs to 3 hours from Broome.


All visitors must comply with the entry regulations as per the signage

This region is only accessible by 4WD. It's recommended to book ahead when visiting the Pender Bay/Middle Lagoon area. Not all locations are open to "drop ins," however, limited tourism places are open for day visits, so it is recommended that you contact your host/s before setting out as bookings are essential and fees are applicable for day passes

PERMITS AND SACRED SITES


The Cape Leveque Road is a public road. However, you will be passing through Native Title Land and private land leases. It passes through the Beagle Bay, Djarindjin and Ardyaloon Aboriginal reserves. These reserves are protected under part III of the Aboriginal Affairs Planning Authority Act 1972 and entry permits are required.

The entry road into Beagle Bay Community is a public road. People may travel through these reserves to other destinations if they have permission (or a booking) but should not turn on to any side roads or other property.

Please always observe road signs and stay out of prohibited areas. There are a number of significant sites on the peninsula, and fines apply to anyone who disregards signs.

STAYING ON OUTSTATIONS & SMALL COMMUNITIES

Many families welcome visitors to camp on their outstation. Camping fees range usually from \$15 - \$20 per person. Always book ahead to ensure they are expecting you and never camp anywhere on the Peninsula without permission, it is Aboriginal land and hefty fines apply. If you are going camping on outstations, be fully prepared. Check with your host to find out what you need to bring and ask if they have power or fresh water available in their camping area.





Today it is famous for its white, heritage listed, Sacred Heart Church which was built by German Pallottine priests and local indigenous people in 1917. Modelled on a black and white photograph of a German village church, the inside shimmers with the mother of pearl shell that decorates the walls, floors and most notably the altar.
